## Trainer's Biography

Dr Patricia McNamara is a Senior Fellow (Hon) in the Department of Social Work, University of Melbourne. She is qualified as a social worker, family therapist and teacher. Patricia has had twenty-five years practice experience as a social worker and family therapist in child and family welfare and mental health settings. She has also, for many years, re-



searched the complex narratives of vulnerable children, adolescents and families. Patricia has extensively taught social work and child and family welfare at undergraduate and postgraduate levels. She has presented academically and delivered training in Australia, New Zealand, The United States, Europe and Asia.

Patricia is lead editor of a forthcoming book on education in out-of-home care from early childhood to tertiary education. The book is an international collection of research, policy and practice in this domain. Patricia's current research projects include a scoping of family partnering in therapeutic residential care and an audit of service users' life trajectories, including education at the point of entry to residential care. Patricia also supervises several doctoral students investigating aspects of out-of-home care. As a foundation Board Member of the International Association for Outcome-Based Evaluation and Research in Family and Children's Services (ia OBER fcs), she has published on qualitative research methods and undertaken several cross-national studies. Patricia has been a Director of Mackillop Family Services, one of Victoria's largest providers of out-of-home care for eight years. She also sits on the Quality and Practice Committee of the E.W. Tipping Foundation, a major disability service provider. Patricia was, for six years, Deputy Board Chair of an inner Melbourne girls' high school which services a socio-culturally diverse community.

## **Learning outcomes**

Participants will be introduced to strategies that have proved successful in improving education outcomes in OHC internationally, and which might be adapted to the context of Hong Kong. Interactive exploration of these ideas will be a key element in the workshop experience. The import of investing strongly in learning during OHC would seem self-evident. Research evidence and practice wisdom in this domain is compelling.

## **Workshop Description**

There is growing concern internationally that educational outcomes for children and young people growing up in out-of-home (OHC) care are often well below those of children in mainstream society. This effectively compromises care leavers' access to life's important opportunities, especially rewarding employment. A strong career almost always on firm educational foundabuilds tions. There is evidence, too, that good learning outcomes, inside and outside the classroom, have much broader impacts; they are often positively associated with lifelong health and wellbeing. Such evidence is convincing of the urgent need to address current educational inequities and poor levels of achievement for children living in OHC and for those leaving care.

This workshop applies an ecological-developmental lens to identify different learning issues that present as children grow and change. Together we will explore formal and informal learning opportunities and challenges encountered by children in OHC from pre-school till the point of transition to tertiary education. There will be a special emphasis on developmental neuropsychology and on the powerful impacts attachment disruption and trauma have on learning. We will also identify family, school, community and larger systems which play a critical role in education outcomes.
